# Estimating Unmet Need for Supported Housing







## Why is this important?

- Supported Housing has a contribution to make to a number of "care" pathways
- Supported Housing is under threat from funding changes





## What did we do?

Undertook a "quick and dirty" piece of work to see if it is possible to find a robust methodology for doing this.

Commissioned by NHF

Started with an "old" methodology used in the days of Supporting People

But changed it to one based on *flows* not *stocks* 

Used a new list of *Client Groups* based on the reason for a presenting need for supported housing

Compared the number of people in need for a housing place in a year with the number of likely available lettings


We think it worked !





## The Methodology

#### The model developed by Sitra is based on a number of key concepts:



#### **Population at risk**

This is an estimate of the total working age population, over the course of a year, who are at risk because they experience a particular situation or event and have particular vulnerabilities that make it difficult for them to resolve the issue themselves. Figures for different at-risk groups were drawn from a number of national data sets.

#### **Population in need**

This is an estimated sub-set of the 'population at risk' that would benefit from a supported housing intervention, as opposed to another intervention. This is based on historical figures that indicate the proportion of at risk people who received supported housing, as opposed to other types of service intervention.

#### Supply

This is an estimate of the number of units available for letting in the year, as opposed to the overall

number of units per se



### **The Results**

TO LET 125,196 lettings needed for people of working age during 2015/16



109,556 **Z** places available for people of working age during 2015/16



shortfall in supported housing for people of working age during 2015/16

We need to use the CLG Research on the size of the supported housing sector. We need robust information from providers on lettings trends




