- 3. As the host, all we ask is you involve fellow delegates in sharing ideas, experience, suggestions about what needs to happen, etc.



Conversations will take place on numbered tables in the main conference room, and delegates will be provided with a list of topics to help them to make the most of the opportunity.

- 4. Delegates are encouraged to make use of this networking session, if you'd like to, and you are welcome to move between tables to make the most of the opportunity to make links on the issues which matter most to you. Look out for leaflets being handed out during the morning which will let you know what's available where.
- 5. All involved in these networking conversations are asked to jot down key issues and suggestions for future action and leave these notes on the table for collation after the conference and feed back to the Faculty.







## **WELCOME**

It is my great pleasure to welcome you to the Faculty for Homeless and Inclusion Health's 6th International Symposium. To the many colleagues who have attended the previous symposia, welcome back, and to new attendees, welcome to your first Faculty symposium.

For this our 6th symposium we meet in interesting times. Political uncertainty and endless austerity have almost become permanent features at home. Widespread discontent with political systems, underpinned by rampant economic inequalities continue to define much of the world. At the same time, and on a small scale, we have the positive potential change represented by the Homelessness Reduction Act, the first substantial legal change to homeless law in nearly 30 years.

At our symposia each year we come together to share knowledge of what works, or at least what colleagues have tried out, to learn from each other, and to extend our collective understanding of Micheal Marmot's 'causes of the causes'. This year we also celebrate the publication of landmark Inclusion Health papers in The Lancet, and the third edition of the Faculty's Service Standards. The Lancet papers represent a 'coming of age' for inclusion health. We hope the Standards, coupled with the new duties coming out of the Homelessness Reduction Act, will help us all push the system for a more urgent and focussed response to our patients needs.

Last year's highlights included Professor David Nutt, exposing the ludicrousness of UK drug and alcohol policies and Dr Gary Bloch from Toronto sharing their direct approach to diagnosing and treating poverty in primary care. Both presentations are still online and well worth looking up. This year we have a rich programme of speakers on the main stage: engaging with local government politicians and the Homelessness Reduction Act. leaders from nursing, from mental health and from the charity sector, and Professor Sir Harry Burns, Scotland's former chief medical officer, reflecting on ten years' experience at the top of Scotland's health system.

We know the NHS faces extreme funding pressure and our public discourse continues to seek to blame the powerless and excluded for society's problems. However homeless health services up and down the country continue to care for and defend their patients (and themselves). And I know many colleagues have introduced new services, created new partnerships and found even better ways of caring for your patients.

This year's workshop programme is rich with examples. Thank you for everything you do to bring good healthcare to the most excluded. It is said that 'The NHS should be at its best where it is needed most.' The examples of work being pre-



sented over the next two days are real examples of how we can meet that need.

I would particularly like to welcome Pathway's 'experts by experience' (EbE) group. A founding principle for the Faculty is to value the unique perspectives lived experience can bring to improving the quality of care. Pathway is delighted to create and support a group of EbE colleagues to try to make sure that views from the street truly inform our discussion and debate over the next two days.

Once again a core steering group of Faculty members have taken a leading role in devising the programme for this year's event. This is the second year that the workshop programme is composed entirely of submissions made in response to our open call for papers. We had over 60 submissions. I know that selecting who to invite was very hard and there were many good presentations that couldn't be accommodated. The steering group deserve our collective thanks for creating such a diverse and rich programme. And welcome to all our speakers over the next two days. Well done for making it onto the programme!

I know that, through working together, we can make a real difference to how the whole NHS responds to excluded patients' needs. And I know that learning happens together, in dialogue and through the relationships that we build. I hope you find inspiration from colleagues gathered together for these two days and enjoy this time together.



The Faculty of Homeless and Inclusion Health, in association with Pathway support a number of educational initiatives which are overseen by the Faculty Education Committee.


The stand will highlight current initiatives including
