Housing and Health: reality check

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Health risks of a housing crisis

- 300,000 people are homeless today, including 128,000 children primarily because of the drastic housing shortage
- A million households at risk of homelessness by 2020 due to Housing Benefit freeze – more than a fifth are receiving disability benefits
- 8 million people in England have had a housing issue in the last five years which affected their mental health
- GPs spontaneously cite poor housing conditions and homelessness as contributing to poor physical and mental health
- Royal College of Paediatricians/CPAG found two thirds of paediatricians said housing problems were a cause of health problems of their patients
- Half had found it difficult to discharge a child from hospital (twothirds for neonatal doctors) because of poor housing



What is being done?

Housing First

Shelter Housing First in Manchester saves the NHS £564K over five years (the biggest saving of any agency)

Advice on Prescription

Maximised income, resolved housing problems, improved wellbeing

Support on discharge from hospital

89% of patients where lack of accommodation was delaying discharge had somewhere suitable to go

Homelessness Reduction Act

Earlier advice and assessment of need

What more can be done locally?

- Joined up commissioning of early advice and support services, including by health commissioners – as urged by Public Health England and the Marmot Review
- Roll out of successful innovations
- Investment in "floating support" to bridge the gap between advice and intensive services like Housing First
- Joined-up local vision for housing, mental health, domestic abuse, "troubled families", children's services, social care

But leadership from government is urgently needed

- Only a tiny proportion of the 300,000 homeless people are rough sleepers or potential first-time buyers
- An acute shortage of affordable homes for rent, coupled with the impact of welfare reform, is leaving people on low incomes destitute
- This emergency can only be relieved by
 - Increasing supply
 - Increasing incomes
 - Reducing cost of renting
 - or all three of these
