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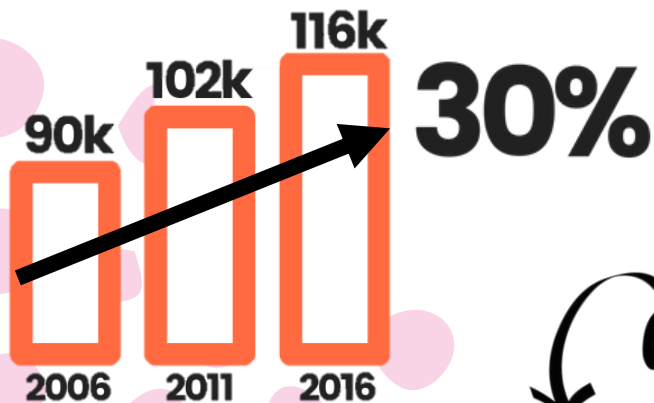

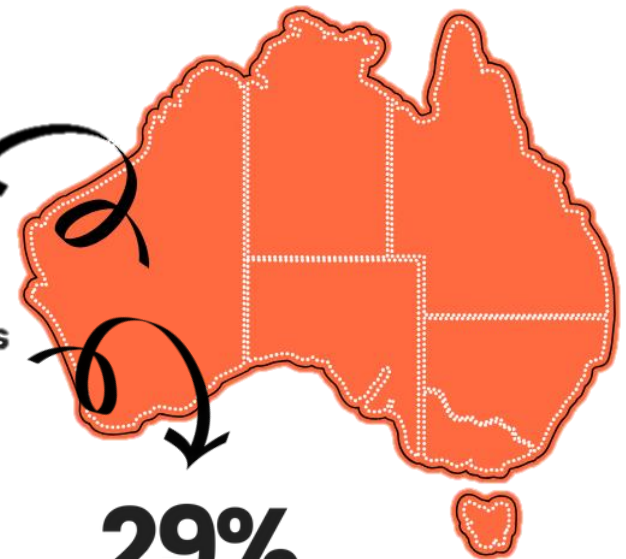

Homelessness in Western Australia

but we have issues with the current data...

- 1) **The data is old:** best available data is from 2016 data (census)
- 2) **The data is static:** census data and street counts are both Point in Time (PiT) counts → how do we ensure that everyone captured
- 3) **Other Govt data shows undercounting of census:** Specialist Homelessness Services data for example shows 290k ppl accessing services in Aus 2018-19 (approx. 25k in WA)
- 4) **Counting up vs. counting down...** To date we have been counting the number of people supported or housed
 - For example: 249 people housed as at end Feb 2020 (Housing First: 50 Lives 50 Homes)

The By Name List

A tool developed by Community Solutions as part of their *Built for Zero* campaign to quantify rough sleeping and track where people are in the housing system

- Measures inflow / outflow of rough sleeping

Aims to achieve ‘functional zero’ for rough sleepers using real-time data

- Seek housing and support solutions for individuals and families experiencing rough sleeping by identifying systematic gaps
- Informs service collaboration and development to improve how the system works

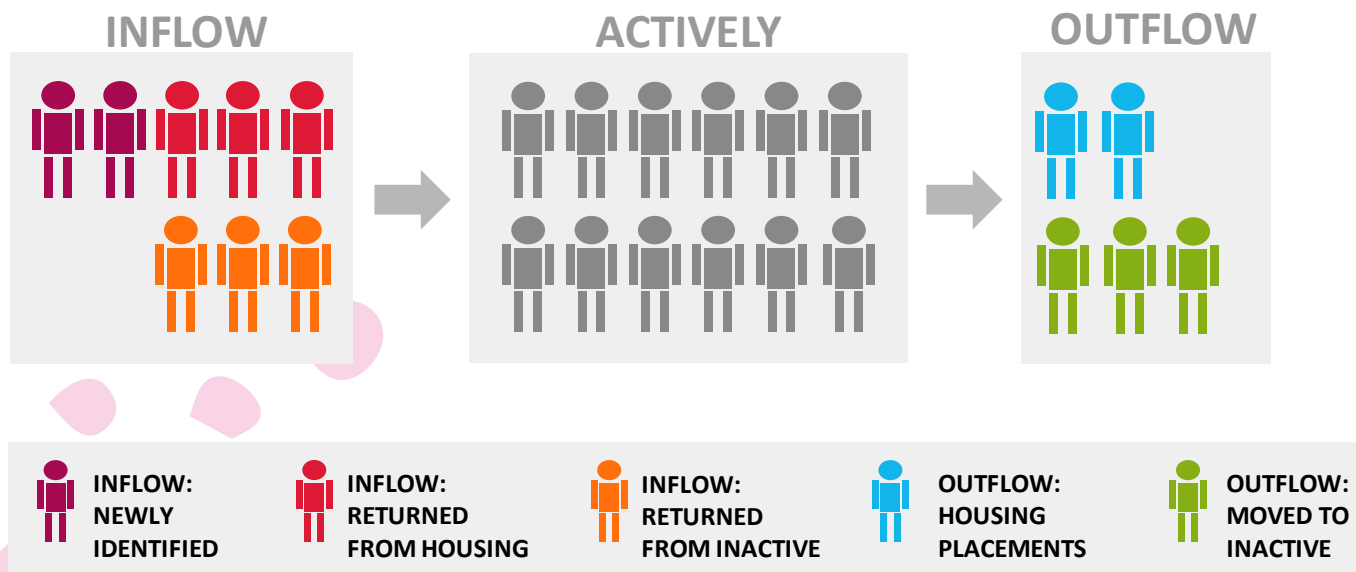
Functional zero: A community has ended chronic homelessness when the number of people experiencing chronic homelessness is zero, or if not zero, than either 3 or .1% of the total number of individuals reported in the most recent point-in-time count, whichever is greater.

Elements of a Quality By-Name List

1. Documented, coordinated outreach
2. Provider participation and common assessment
3. Able to list all known single adults
4. Inactive policy
5. Tracking without full assessment
6. Policy for data quality and completeness
7. Tracking homeless status
8. Unique identifier
9. Tracking newly identified people
10. Tracking returns to homelessness
11. Tracking outflow
12. Tracking population based statuses
13. Tracking changes after initial entry

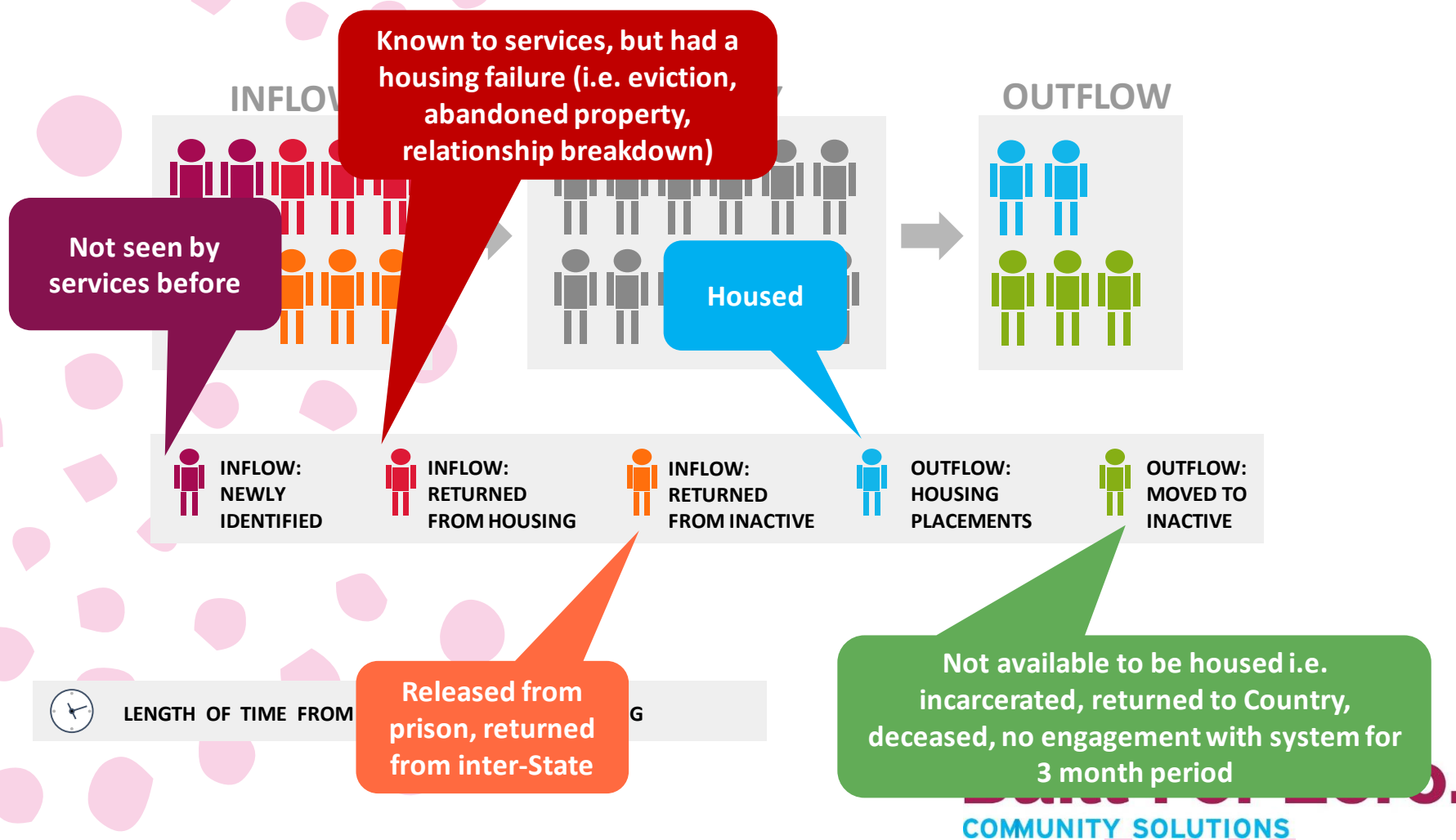

What will the BNL do for us?

1) Tell us who our rough sleepers are

2) ...what their needs are

- Have they commenced their housing paperwork
- Do they need FDV support ..
- Do they need a 1 bed property..

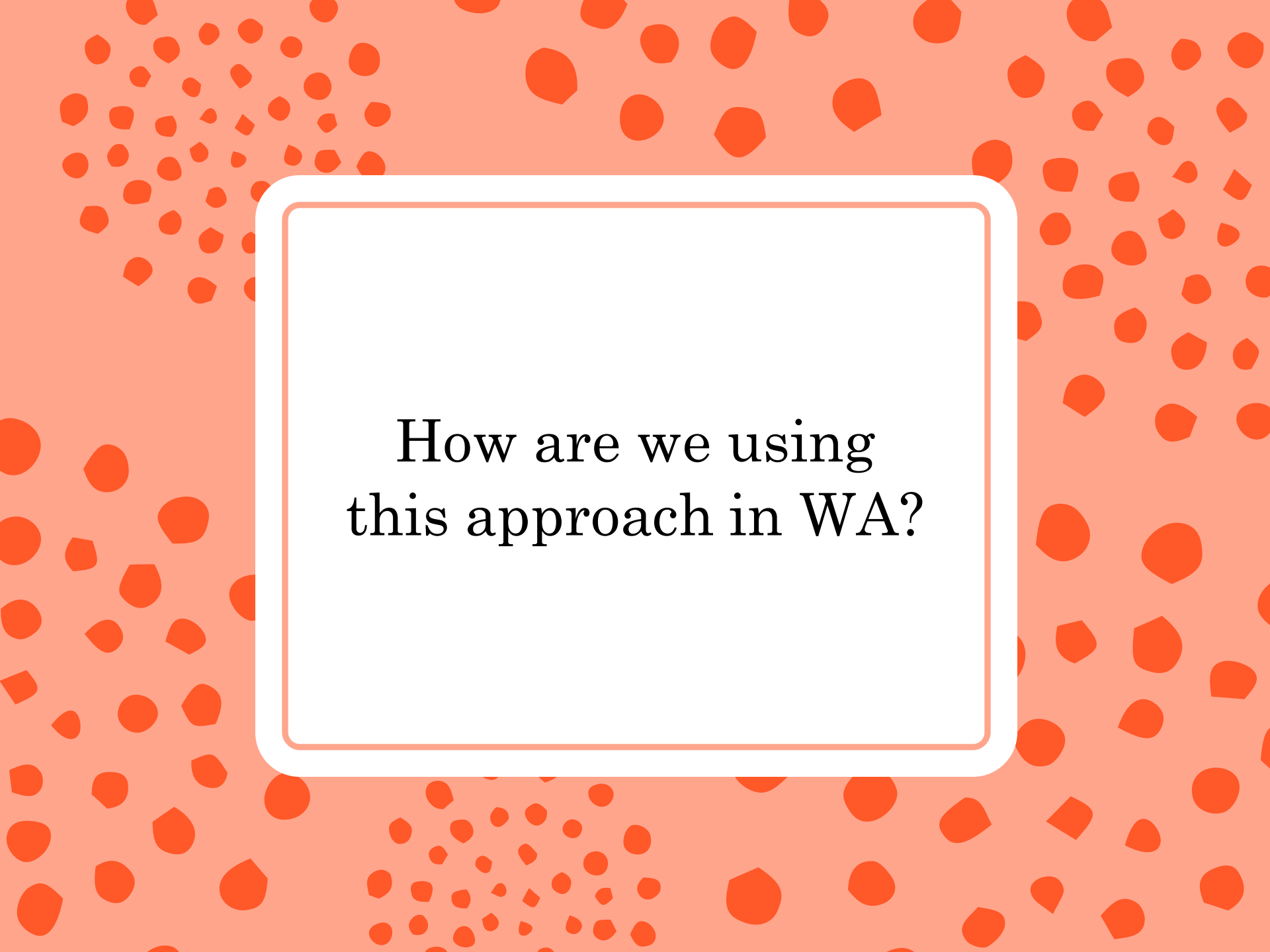
3) ...who is working with each person

- case worker / organisation supported by
- Housing worker

4) Identify patterns in the data

- ++ inflow from prison – may need prison pathway service
- ++ outflow inactive – may need improved outreach

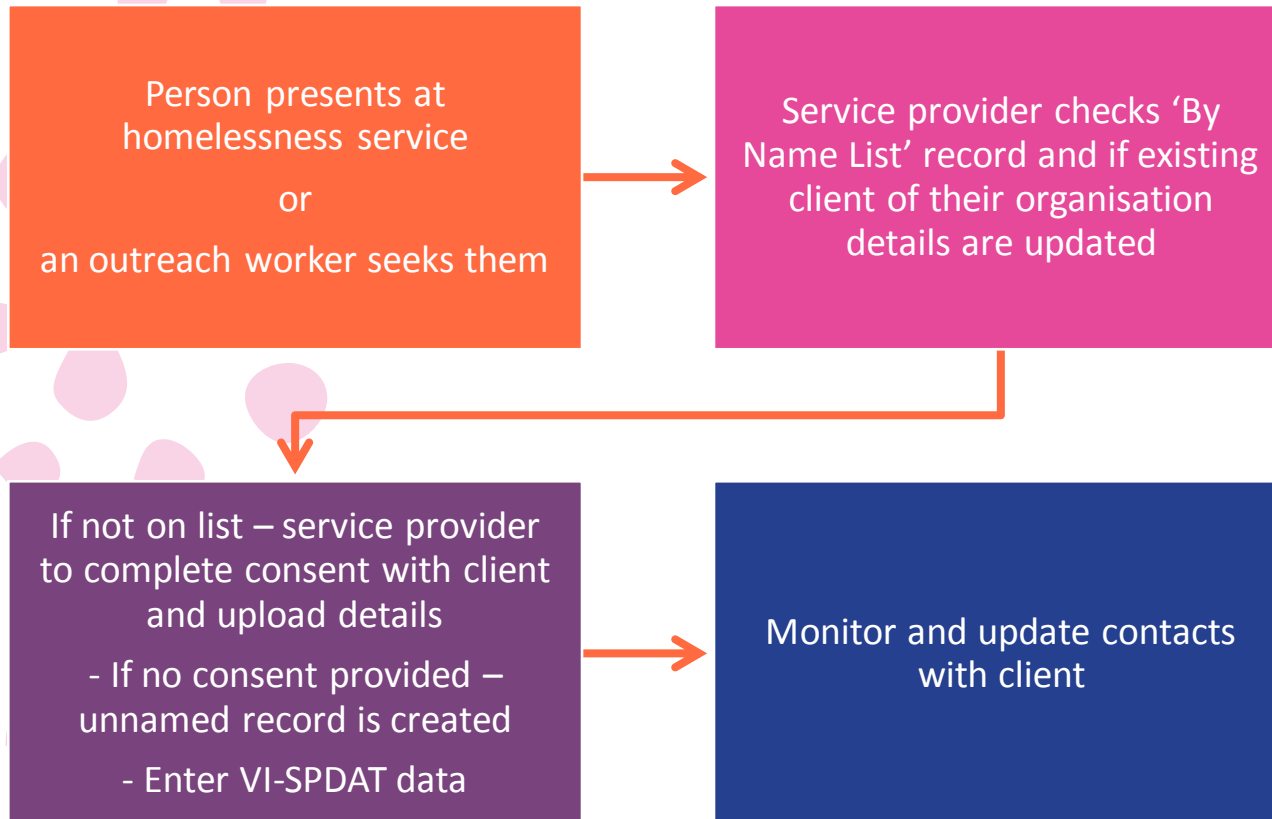
5) Allow for joint lobbying for funding (i.e. we will have solid data to say xx people need xx service)

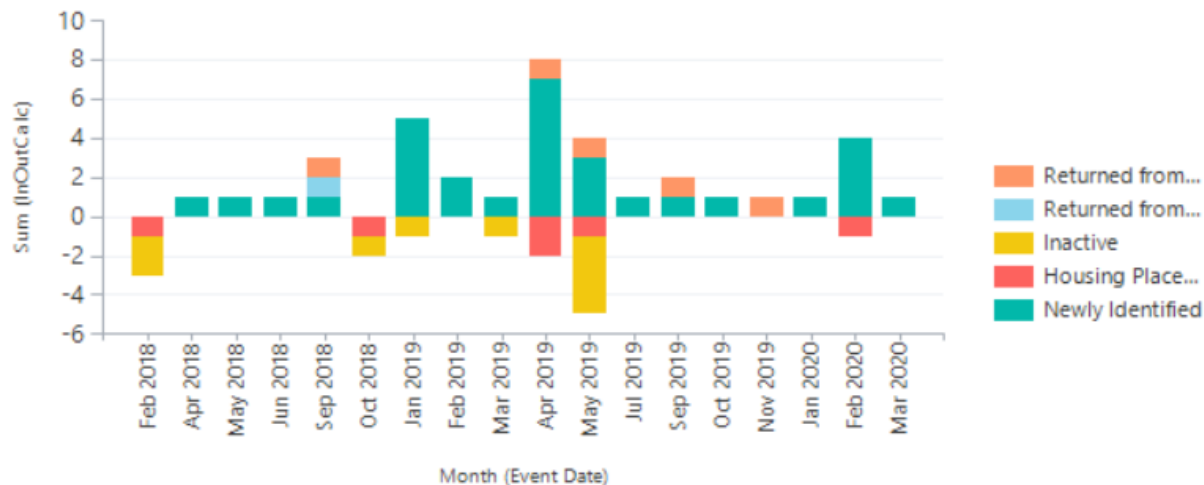

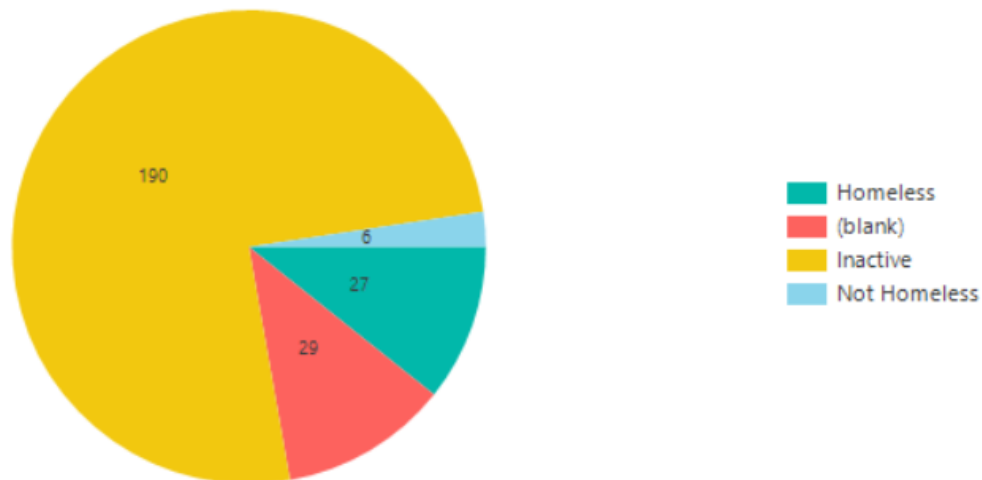
